Welcome to a very special issue of LaVoce. Givens Violins celebrates twenty years of business this year. It is a great privilege to have been a part of the violin business and string players' lives for the last twenty years. I have tried to offer inventory of the highest quality in all price ranges and also offer musicians choice, reliability and quality. From a staff of one (just me!) in 1977, the business has expanded over the years to a current staff of twelve: six in the workshop and six in support and sales.

Our reputation in the violin business and the good will of the string community are important to us and we work constantly to improve and surpass our previous standards. Our successes, I feel, are due to the guiding principle of 'service to the string community,' and a commitment to fine craftsmanship. Also, I have been fortunate through the years to add staff who have been dedicated, sincere and committed to the world of violin making and string players.

As the business has grown we have been able to give back to the community in the form of prizes for highly respected competitions for serious string students, and by supporting an annual master class series at MacPhail Center for the Arts, as well as two commissions for youth orchestra.

We have helped young players choose their first eighth-sized instruments and have been able to offer them advice and instruments as they have grown. Some have gone on to professional careers in music and others have used their musical talents in community orchestras. We are happy to have helped them make appropriate choices and to have our workshop available for repairs and adjustments.

It has been crucial to our success to establish firm and trusted relationships with vendors and makers who are responsive to our high standards of quality. We have traveled the world to find makers and develop relationships that allow us to offer the finest instruments and bows in all ranges. We enjoy representing the instruments and bows from a variety of current violin makers, especially those from the very fine modern American school.

We have had the opportunity to influence the understanding of the history of violin making and its development. Our contributions in this area include hosting the Eighth International Competition of the Violin Society of America in Minneapolis in 1988; publishing *Violin & Bow Makers of Minnesota* by Thomas Wenberg, a unique book tracing the history of violin making in Minnesota from the late 1800s; and recently, supporting the exhibit, "The British Violin: 400 Years of Violin Making in the British Isles," in London this year.

Good fortune and our work in common brought Andrew Dipper and myself together, and we married in 1989. That same year, Andrew moved his workshop, Dipper Restorations, to Minneapolis and joined Givens Violins. This was a most significant turning point in the growth of the business. Andrew, a highly respected musical instrument maker and scholar of the history of violin making, brought to Givens Violins an impressive body of knowledge, with his highly specialized and rare skills in the area of the conservation and restoration of historic instruments.

Of course, no success would have been possible without the help of family and friends, staff over the years and certainly the many wonderful string teachers in the community, string players and string enthusiasts. Thank you.

Dipper Restorations

In preparation for my upcoming lecture series, ■ "History and Construction of the Violin," for the University of Minnesota's Compleat Scholar program, March 18 through April 1, I reviewed many of the major restoration projects completed by Andrew Dipper Restorations over the last nine years and was surprised by the variety of instruments, the kinds of work performed, and the range of dates of manufacture, for example: a viol by Ventura di Linarol, 1582; a lute by Vendelio Venere, 1601; a guitar by Tieffenbrucker, 1630; a mandolino by Antonio Stradivari, 1680; a Peter Wamsley cello, with bone inlay on the fingerboard, 1760; a guitar made by Delaplanque, with ivory edgework and patterns of ebony, mother-of-pearl, and ivory along the neck, around the edges and encircling the sound hole, 1760; and a lavish 1850 Napoleon guitar by Anciume, encrusted with abolalone and mother-of-pearl; and many other amazing instruments.

Projects for 1998 include the first translation into English of the violin making notes of N. Lupot, the so-called 'Stradivari' of the French school; the cataloging of our considerable library of violin making literature; the restoration of a beautiful little 18th century French pochette in its original leather case; and the restoration of some very complete and wonderful 18th century violins and violas in original condition.
